

One of the things that has been said about me through the years (and which I agree with) is that I tend to be a very loyal person: for example, I have been married to the same woman for 34 years and have been the pastor of only two parishes in 33 years.

As a loyal person, it takes a lot for me to quit something or on somebody; I only change associations or relationships reluctantly, when it seems that there is no other recourse.

How do I define loyalty? Primarily, loyalty is defined by "who is there" in my life. People can say they're loyal, but it's their actions that reveal the truth of their words. If someone insisted that they were loyal but were hardly ever present, you would question that, wouldn't you?

Near the end of his earthly ministry, shortly before he was to be crucified, Jesus encountered the issue of loyalty:

After this (the feeding of the 5000) many of his disciples turned back and no longer walked with him. So, Jesus said to the twelve, "Do you want to go away as well?" Simon Peter answered him, "Lord, to whom shall we go? You have the words of eternal life, and we have believed, and have come to know, that you are the Holy One of God." - John 6:66-69

If someone professes to be a member of a congregation, but rarely attends or supports the church through their financial gifts and talents, what conclusion could be drawn from such an absence (other than illness, away for the winter or another good reason)?

Likewise, there may be some in the congregation who may not always agree with me personally or may even take umbrage with some of my positions on things, but who nevertheless remain: when they do so, I don't interpret that only as personal loyalty to me or even to this congregation, but assume that they remain because they're being fed spiritually (and receiving other blessings) by remaining at this particular congregation.

Ultimately, a Christian's loyalty ought to be to our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ, who alone suffered, died, and rose again from the dead for our salvation. Throughout my ministry, I have striven to point others to Jesus, and not to myself as pastor nor to anyone or anything else. Above all, "It's all about Jesus."

In looking at my life I must face the fact that I have not always been loyal to Jesus, or even some of the people in my life. Despite this, Jesus has always remained faithful to me. The Apostle Paul assured his protege Timothy, *"If we are faithless, he (Jesus) remains faithful— for he cannot deny himself." - 2* Timothy 2:13

Regardless of our loyalty or lack of it, let us give thanks to Jesus for always "being there" in our lives.

"By the second verse, the congregation had joined the soloist in the hymn," Neff says. "By the third verse, the tenor was beginning to find the range. By the fourth verse, it was beautiful. And on the fifth verse, the congregation was absolutely silent, and the tenor sang the most beautiful solo of his life."
