

In January of every year I make my annual visit to my ophthalmologist. Thanks to his knowledge and skill, I can see 20/20 with the aid of corrective lenses. It truly is a blessing to see clearly!

As we enter another new year, a milestone of sorts is being achieved: we are now entering the "Roaring 20's!" There are still people living who were born in the 1920's, and (as was stated at the last voters meeting) Pilgrim will be observing her 100th anniversary in 2022.

When we begin a new year there is usually some hope and optimism over what lies ahead. Sometimes we use a new calendar year to put aside some habits or practices that are no longer beneficial for us and put on something "new."

Politicians and athletes, among others, often speak of "20/20 hindsight." It's easy to look back on the past and say, "Knowing what I know now, THIS is what I should have done!" Feelings of guilt may overwhelm us when we regret the things we did and lament over the things we should have done (Romans 7:13-25).

Rather than getting bogged down in "20/20 hindsight," it is far better to pray for "20/20 foresight." That is, pray for God's direction and guidance in the year ahead. Since we remain fallible human beings, our choices and decisions will never be perfect – there is always some "trial and error." However, it is always better to seek the will and direction of the Lord than to "go it alone."

I am reminded of the "man born blind" in John, Chapter Nine. As Jesus opened his eyes, the man could not only see physically, but spiritually: he came to believe in the Savior who gave him his sight. By contrast, the pharisees who attacked Jesus for the miracle had sight but remained spiritually blind: they were unwillingly to recognize the Messiah who stood before them.

As we begin a new year (and decade), I am mindful of the many who continue to "stumble and bumble" around in life, without any spiritual guidance or direction. They need Jesus. By making Jesus known to others, we pray that at least some will receive spiritual "sight" and believe.

And for those suffering from "20/20 hindsight," be assured that Jesus regularly and completely forgives the sins of repentant believers who cry out to him in mercy. When the pastor proclaims Absolution in Jesus' Name, you can be sure that you are receiving forgiveness from Jesus himself.

If there is a particular sin that troubles you, and you need further reassurance, private Confession and Absolution is available; whatever is confessed is private and will not be divulged by the pastor. If you desire this, please let me know.

In any case, may the Lord grant us a blessed 2020!

We pray that this year, 2020, will bring you good health, lots of joy and that inner PEACE from God.



Quite a story

I have been taking some time the last few days to reflect on church music in general over the past year. One of the things that I often think about is congregational singing. I ask myself, "Am I doing everything I can to enable singing to occur in every service?" I wonder what people are thinking when a hymn is being sung. There are times when I sense a participant is singing with their whole heart. This past Sunday a conversation was overheard about "Go Tell it on the Mountain." One attendee was mentioning how much she enjoyed singing it and (Oh my!) a person actually clapped their hands as the song was being sung! From my vantage point at the piano, it actually gave me goosebumps. That's what I call putting your whole heart into a song.

I would like to make some goals for the new year. One of the goals that is perhaps both a challenging goal, but worthwhile one is to come up with ideas to help bolster congregational singing. I recently read an article written by Keith Getty from 2014 in "The Gospel Coalition" focusing on how to improve congregational singing. Based on what I read, I think we have several of the needed foundational aspects for good congregational singing. Our pastor is vitally interested in congregational singing, as he is in all aspects of the service. And Pastor Ben has a commendable way to model participation in the singing of hymns. Also, my opinion is that we sing great hymns, hymns specifically chosen to be sung in our services. This article also states: "Throughout Scripture, the command to sing is given to God's people more than 400 times. <u>Ephesians 5:19</u> instructs believers to address one another in "psalms and hymns and spiritual songs." Week after week, we are spiritually renewed, realigned, and sanctified by singing to the Lord and singing to each other as the body of Christ."

So, as we begin a new year, I personally would like to invite you to sing out. It doesn't matter if you are able to sing well or not. What matters is that you ARE singing!



Your prayers are urgently requested for translator Päivi Räsänen in Finland. Päivi, who is a Christian medical doctor and a member of the Finnish Parliament (Christian Democrats), is being investigated for "incitement to hatred" for her work on a 2004 publication supported by LHF, concerning Christian marriage and homosexuality.

"[This is] a Preliminary Investigation of a pamphlet I wrote in 2004," writes Päivi. "Not only was I interrogated by the police for four hours last Friday regarding my Twitter account, but now I am facing further interrogations." (*To read the inspector's press release, go to LHFmissions.org.*)

"Police investigations concern not only Päivi who wrote it, but also the Lutheran Foundation - Finland, which published it," said Rev. Juhana Pohjola, coordinator of the Finnish translation projects.

Great exploits

Colorado pastor Mike Paulison, who's made many mission trips to Haiti to build and maintain an orphanage, shares about **prayer's power**:

"On one trip, we were bringing large items that could've been problematic, because in Haiti customs officials often make up their own rules. We urged our prayer-support team back home to be praying as we went through customs. But when a storm delayed our flight from Miami for two hours, the schedule was off. We encouraged one another, saying at least prayers had been lifted. Later, on the plane to Haiti, I noticed I'd made a mistake on the schedule. It was off by exactly two hours. The supporters were actually praying the very moment we landed in Port-au-Prince!

"In line at customs, we watched officials opening luggage. But by the time we got to the front, the inspectors were gone, and we were allowed to walk into the country. We experienced firsthand the promise in Daniel 11:32b (NKJV): 'The people who know their God shall be strong and carry out great exploits.""



Did you know that LHM has ministry centers in more than 30 countries around the world? Our local staff use a variety of programs to connect people in their community with the love of Jesus. For example, Project Joel is a children's program carried out in local schools, many of them public! Bible Correspondence Courses are held throughout the world, both in small group settings and individually, allowing people to learn about the God of the Bible. Feed my sheep

When Katie Davis traveled to Uganda in 2006 to do mission work during her senior year of high school, she didn't expect to fall in love with the people and culture. She also didn't expect to return after graduation — or to adopt 13 orphans within a few years.

Davis, who details her adventures in Kisses From Katie (Howard Books), helps bring food, medical care, education and Jesus' love to hundreds of children while raising her 13 daughters. Yet she insists she's not particularly brave or strong. "I'm just doing what God called me to do as a follower of him," Davis says. "Feed his sheep, do unto the least of his people."

Although she's been exposed to diseases and deplorable conditions in Uganda, Davis willingly accepts the risks. "I'm much more terrified of living a comfortable life in a self-serving society and failing to follow Jesus than I am of any illness or tragedy," she writes. "I have yet to find where [Jesus] warned us to be safe."
