

“Retirement in the Bible”

As we enter January and the promise of a New Year it also marks the beginning of a new start for me, as my birthday is January 5th, the day before Epiphany. Because I am getting older, invariably I am asked “When are you going to retire?” This question is usually asked by my friends and acquaintances outside the congregation; I am rarely asked it by anyone inside the congregation.

As you can see, the heading of this article is “Retirement in the Bible.” If I were to stick strictly to this theme, I wouldn’t have much to write about as the Bible has little to say about the topic. There is only one reference to retirement that I can find in the Scriptures, and that is the retirement of the Levites (the priests came from this tribe during the time of Moses):

²³ And the LORD spoke to Moses, saying, ²⁴ “This applies to the Levites: from twenty-five years old and upward they^[a] shall come to do duty in the service of the tent of meeting. ²⁵ And from the age of fifty years they shall withdraw from the duty of the service and serve no more. ²⁶ They minister^[b] to their brothers in the tent of meeting by keeping guard, but they shall do no service. Thus shall you do to the Levites in assigning their duties.” - Numbers 8

Of course, 50 was considered “old” during that time, and we are no longer under the Levitical system. While the Bible has little to say about retirement, it has a lot to say regarding the value of work. Even when we retire, we work in other directions: going to Wegman’s is “work.” Taking care of grandchildren is “work.” Engaging in volunteer activities is “work.” You get my point.

Simply put, the Christian never retires from service to the Lord. Even when I retire from fulltime church work, whenever that day comes, the Lord will find other venues of service for me both inside and outside the church. As the saying goes, “The Christian retires feet first.”

My prayer for myself is that God will keep me in good health and vitality until the day he calls me home. This brings to mind the death of Moses:

⁵ And Moses the servant of the LORD died there in Moab, as the LORD had said. ⁶ He buried him^[a] in Moab, in the valley opposite Beth Peor, but to this day no one knows where his grave is. ⁷ Moses was a hundred and twenty years old when he died, yet his eyes were not weak nor his strength gone. ⁸ The Israelites grieved for Moses in the plains of Moab thirty days, until the time of weeping and mourning was over. – Deuteronomy 34

We, on the church council, miss seeing you and have missed meeting you at Voters' Meetings this past year. But I can assure you, the council has been busy and continuing to meet this year via Zoom.

Our March and April meetings were essential to discuss the Covid -19 guidelines for worship which Pastor and the elders later worked out in detail. In March and April, the church council discussed and applied for the Paycheck Protection Program, which Pilgrim qualified to receive. The funds received have been a great blessing to the congregation. At this time I would also like to thank Mike Wuerch, Financial Secretary for all he has done to keep track of donations coming in through the plate, mail and online.

As the year progressed we have discussed the budget and the impact Covid -19 has made on our ministry at Pilgrim. We listened to the VBS and Sunday school committees as they presented ways to provide Vacation Bible School and Sunday school materials to church families during the summer and fall of this year, and approved those plans. The council would also like to extend a special thank you to the Esther Circle for their outreach efforts. They have been and are a blessing to our congregation and the community at large. Also, thank you to Mary Werth, editor of the *Pilgrim's Progress*, for helping us all stay informed and connected.

- **Enhancing Communication:** Our next Church Council meeting will be held on Zoom January 20th at 6:30 pm. If any congregational member has any matters they would like


to bring before the council and add to the Agenda, please email me, Tim McGuan at stmcguan@gmail.com and I will get in touch with you.




