

As we enter the new year, usually it is accompanied by a great deal of anticipation and excitement. I know I always look forward to the new year and the possibilities it brings.

As I announced at the December voters meeting, my intention is to retire from pastoral ministry beginning September 2023.

My main goals for 2023 are (1) to install the new organ and (2) to prepare the congregation for my successor. Of course, that is in addition to the many other things I do as pastor.

As was also stated at the voters meeting, Donald LoVullo will not be pursuing the Specific Ministry Program. Donald has decided that the pastoral ministry is not for him, and that's OK. It is a special calling from God, validated by the Church, and it isn't for everyone. We thank Donald for allowing himself to be considered for the program. I do regret that Donald has decided that he and his family will leave the congregation, which I do not believe is necessary. I want them to stay and be of service to the Lord here. Please pray for Donald and his family.

In the 30 years I have served as pastor of Pilgrim, our congregation has weathered many changes and challenges through the years. I will admit that the issues pertaining to Covid-19 have been particularly challenging. It has been difficult navigating the different political and social views of some. I want to keep the Gospel front and center, not politics or social issues.

I am very thankful for the solid, faithful core group of believers who are active and present. I have been disappointed by some who, for various reasons, have chosen to "drop out" and not participate in the worship and life of the congregation.

I am sorry if my decision to retire has caused pain or confusion for some. I do believe that Pilgrim needs a change, a different presence and voice to lead the people. Perhaps some of the stray sheep will listen to a new voice, and perhaps some new ones too.

My decision to retire isn't just about Pilgrim. I will be 66 this January and I'm thinking about the years ahead. Linda and I want to do some traveling, among other things, while we are still capable of doing so. The years take their toll, and no one can beat time.

I want to assure you that there is One who is in charge of Pilgrim, and that Someone is Jesus Christ our Lord. While I do believe that he wants me "off the stage," I also believe he has someone else in mind to lead this congregation. I will pray and trust that he will.

As we enter this new year, remember that "Jesus Christ is the same yesterday, today, and forever." - *Hebrews 13:8* Amidst all the changes and challenges of this earthly life, we have the certainty that Jesus is the Lord of the Church. Let us place our trust in him as we go forward in faith.



January Tree of Life Celebration

On January 8th we will celebrate the sixth lesson of the Tree of Life series. The lesson, "Jesus is Baptized Into God's Plan" comes from the Bible text, Matthew 3:13-17. Writing our life — with God's help

A journalist once said you can measure the quality of a piece of writing by the quality of what has been cut. No matter how beautiful or interesting a phrase or sentence is, the piece may be stronger without it.

Rabbi Evan Moffic applies this wisdom to life in general. Too often we refuse to let something — a habit, a memory, a process — go, even when it no longer serves us. Thinking of our life as a book, we can cut out, edit or rearrange some pages or sentences to reflect our new learnings and growth.

This is not always easy, but we don't have to do it alone. "God is our 'editor-in-chief," says Moffic, "and we are part of God's story. [While] God ... gives us free will to decide what to write on the pages of our lives, ... God is always there for conversation and consultation. And God left us a great guidebook called the Bible. Its lessons make our writing shine with truth and beauty." With God's guidance, what will you "write" in the new year?



A Voters Meeting was held on December 18th after the service. The Council President, Recording Secretary and Financial Secretary have all agreed to extend their terms for two more years. No other nominations were made, and they were voted in. The head elder is going off the board, so one of the remaining elders will become head elder and a new elder will probably be appointed in January.

Pastor Ben announced that he will be retiring in September of 2023. A lot of details will need to be addressed in the coming months by the church council and the congregation.

The LoVullo family is leaving Pilgrim. They will definitely be missed. We know they have prayerfully considered their decision and we ask that God continue to bless them wherever they go.

The next meeting will be on March 19, 2023. We adjourned and closed with the Lord's Prayer.

La Mision Luterana del Peru

About This Mission Grant

Castillo Fuerte (Mighty Fortress) Mercy House is an outreach of the LCMS Missions in Latin America and the Caribbean and was started in 2013. The people of Lima are unable to fully finance the work of the Mercy House, and the work of our missionaries, who feed the souls with the Word of God and show the love of Christ by feeding the parents and children's stomachs. Families come to receive food for their physical bodies, and they stay because of Jesus' love for them as He feeds them the spiritual food which sustains their souls. The healing power of Christ's love and redemption shine into the broken lives of the families making them whole. This grant would partner with La Mision Luterana and Castillo Fuerte to work together to care for the children and families of Lima, Peru, by providing for the needs of the body and of the soul.



Missionaries and locals serve lunch at Castillo Fuerte Mercy House of La Mision Luterana. Every day children receive a healthy, well balanced, hot meal at the Mercy House. MENTAL HEALTH - A BIG DEAL AT ST. PETER'S LUTHERAN CHURCH

As part of its Community of Care vision plan, St. Peter's Lutheran Church & School in Fort Wayne, Indiana, holds quarterly events that feature a speaker or activity, along with a meal. To celebrate the increased awareness on mental health issues this past year, St. Peter's offered gifts to attendees at a recent event. Among these were LHM resources such as *The Vibrant Conversations Deck* of playing cards from our *Households of Faith* kit and our *30 Days of Household Devotions*.

"The Community of Care has already proven to be an outreach tool," said Michelle Leahy, pastoral care coordinator for St. Peter's. "In addition to the order from LHM, we've ordered books on grief, caregiving, pain/suffering, rest, and a few other topics. We're also offering a game for families and a calendar of activities to help reduce stress. The LHM cards and devotions will be offered to everyone as a way to strengthen the family."

St. Peter's belongs to a Lutheran community of 91 churches in northeast Indiana that are members of The Lutheran Foundation, a grant organization zeroed in on "transforming and supporting the physical, mental, and spiritual well-being of our community," per its website, **thelutheranfoundation.org**. Beginning in 1904 as the Fort Wayne Lutheran Hospital, the Foundation began in 1995 from proceeds of the original hospital sale. It has awarded more than \$200-plus million in grants to organizations, schools, and churches in northern Indiana.

People with mental health concerns are sometimes closer than we think. Recently, before attending a Look Up conference on faith and mental health issues sponsored by The Lutheran Foundation, Leahy said she met a woman whose son had a severe mental illness - but no one knew. She kept it hidden from those in the church for fear of the stigma attached to her son's illness. "She was so afraid of being judged and shamed that she isolated herself from the very community that could have loved and supported her," Leahy said.

People are seeing St. Peter's care ministry as a safe place to express their mental health experiences. "Once they receive care here, then we have the opportunity to share the Gospel with them and enfold them into our Community of Care," Leahy said. LHM's resources complement the church's mission of bringing the light of the Gospel to real-world problems. Our Christ-centered podcasts, **Project Connect** booklets, **LHM Learn** courses, and Barna-based materials speak to a host of concerns. They're available at <u>lhm.org</u>.

TASTY CREATIONS

Make this yummy treat to remember what happened on each day of Creation.


What you need:

- 6 large pretzel rods
- Candy melts (white, chocolate and blue)
- Green sprinkles
- White or star-shaped sprinkles
- Fish crackersAnimal
- crackers • Adult help



What you do:

- 1. With help, melt the three colors of candy melts in separate dishes. Microwave for 30 seconds at a time, stirring until soft.
- 2. Decorate one pretzel for each day of Creation:
 - Dip half in white and half in chocolate to show light and darkness.
 - Dip half in white and half in blue to show separation of the atmosphere.
 - Dip half in chocolate, add green sprinkles and dip half in blue to show land, plants and water.
 - Dip in chocolate and add white or star sprinkles to show the stars.
 - Dip in blue and add fish crackers to show sea life.
 - Dip in chocolate and add animal crackers to show land animals.
- 3. Share the Creation story and the snack with a friend!



Answer: sixth, first, third, second, third, first, fifth, fourth, fifth, fourth, sixth; God saw all that he had made, and it was very good.
