

FROM THE PASTOR

"For whatever was written in former days was written for our instruction, that through endurance and through the encouragement of the Scriptures we might have hope." Romans 15:4

"I will meditate on your precepts and fix my eyes on your ways. I will delight in your statutes; I will not forget your word." Psalm 119: 15-16

If you follow me on Facebook, you may have seen in the last month a post in which I referenced a post from Pastor Eder about Bible study. In the post I said the following, "While I'd love for people to ask questions and give responses, you are not obligated to speak, though I'd hope you would eventually feel comfortable to do so. We are always in need of Biblical instruction, we are always in need of a refresher in things that we have learned, and we are always in need of the Gospel of Christ, all this you will find in Bible study."

I would like to break down those comments further as an encouragement for you to attend Bible study. The first part was in reference to concerns that people have come up to Pastor Eder and myself about being nervous about asking questions or being called upon to answer questions. The first of which questions are important, it's what allows us to learn or better understand what we need and want to know about a given subject. So yes, feel free to ask questions, when it comes to scripture there are no stupid questions, and don't be afraid to ask questions pertaining to topics that are not relevant to what we are studying, we are not in a school and I am not obligated to cover certain things over another for the sake of an exam (there are no exams in Bible study, unless you want some), you never know when someone else needs that same answer to your questions.

The next part deals with the need for Bible study, this is a big thing, we are all in need of constant Biblical study, for as you have heard me preach, it is one of the ways that God guards, guides, keeps, and strengthens our faith. God guards our faith in Bible study by arming you with the knowledge of the Word, if the only instruction of the faith comes a from Saturday or Sunday church, while great and of the utmost importance, we are never going to come close to knowing God's revealed Word if we are only learning it once a week. Also, God through Bible study teaches us of the traps of the world, the Devil and our own sinful nature of which we need to be on guard for, and of the Gospel which saves and forgives us, this strengthens our faith. The constant hearing and learning of God's Word help to keep our hearts, minds, and lips on Christ which helps to keep us in the faith.

Lastly the need for a refresher of the basics, this can sometimes seem to be a bit boring, "I have already learned this." Well, first, you have not heard me cover some of these books or some of these teachings, while what I say will be largely the same, I will also probably cover a particular angle that you may have not heard. Second, sometimes getting a refresher is never a bad thing. For instance, when was the last time you opened the catechism, you might remember some of these things, but can you explain the 4th petition to the Lord's prayer (give us this day our daily bread), some of us might but it has been my experience that most have not. It is these basics that need to be reinforced constantly. Take for instance a football practice, if you go to training camp or ask a media personnel for the local news what a practice is like, they will tell that they start out with warming up and practicing the basics, blocking, throwing, catching, running, tackling, etc.. It is even more important with faith, remembering and even relearning these things will help us through all circumstances. Whenever I visit shut ins or people on their deathbed, it is always these basic things that they recall, even when their memories are fading, and so we find our hope and comfort in these teachings that God gives to us.

So, I invite you, come to Bible study, grow in the knowledge of the Word, have your faith strengthened by the Spirit, and enjoy the time with your brothers and sisters in the faith.

The reformer Martin Luther once dreamed that he saw Jesus approaching his door. Luther panicked, seeing that his home was an absolute disaster inside. "How am I going to let the Lord of Life, Jesus Christ, come into a mess like this?" he wondered.

Luther raced to clean up, but the mess only increased. As Jesus knocked, Luther was resigned. "Come on in, if you think you can come into a place like this," he told Jesus ... only to turn around and see that everything was now in order. All Luther had to do was let Jesus enter.

"Mercy is always a messy business," writes pastor Daniel Emery Price at 1517.org. That's true of the Reformation, just as it was when Jesus cleared moneychangers out of the temple. "There will always be those who condemn the mercy because of the mess," notes Price. "Reformation is always about clearing the path to God's radical grace."

DUTIES OF THE OFFICERS

As Written in Pilgrims Constitution

The President of the Congregation Shall

- 1. Act as the chief officer of the congregation and spokesperson for the congregation in secular matters that pertain to the congregation
- 2. Prepare an agenda for and preside at all Voters' Meetings
- 3. Enforce the Constitution and Bylaws of this congregation and carry out the expressed will of the congregation, coordinating functions, plans, and activities in the furtherance of the work of Christ's Kingdom.
- 4. Appoint ad hoc committee chairpersons and attend meetings of boards, committees, and groups in the congregation as desired
- 5. Vote at all Church Council meetings, and vote at the Voters' Meetings in case of a tie
- 6. Act in the absence of the Treasurer
- B. The Vice-President shall
- 1. Carry out the functions of the President when the President is absent
- 2. Prepare an agenda for and preside at all meetings of the Church Council
- 3. Be the Parliamentarian at the Voters' Meetings
- 4. Be in charge of the periodic review of the Constitution and its Bylaws and prepare any amendments for Voters' Meetings
- 5. Vote at all Voters' Meetings, and vote at the Church Council meetings in case of a tie

The Secretary Shall

- 1. Record the minutes of all Voters' and Church Council meetings in a legible form, keep the attendance roster for the meetings, and keep these with the permanent records of the congregation.
- 2. Notify the members of the congregation of meetings
- 3. Prepare and issue all official correspondence from the congregation, including acknowledgements of memorials received
- 4. Keep a permanent record of the official acts of the church

The Financial Secretary Shall

- 1. Receive all monies contributed to the congregation, supervise its counting, deposit such monies and give a receipt of the monies to the Treasurer
- 2. Present a current financial report at all congregational and church council meetings
- 3. Distribute offering envelopes and financial reports
- 4. Work with the Pastor in the area of stewardship
- 5. Prepare and deliver weekly contribution reports to the Pastor
- 6. Keep weekly attendance and contribution records
- 7. Prepare and deliver quarterly tax receipts to the church's contributors




We are still investigating the purchasing of an AED and having training provided.

About This Mission Grant

Lutheran High School of Greater New Orleans, the only high school in the LCMS Southern District, has been serving youth for over 50 years. It provides students with the opportunity to academically succeed in a safe environment, while educating them about their Lord and Savior through the teachings of the LCMS. Many of the students being served by the school are disadvantaged, culturally diverse, and unchurched.

Because the school was devastated by Hurricane Ida, funds which would have been used for computers, school supplies, Christian materials, and scholarship aid are now being used for construction costs to rebuild one of the buildings.

This grant will be matched by five generous donors and will be used to pay the tuition costs of ten students.




Hurricane Ida peeled back the roofs on the three buildings.

Help Us Celebrate LHM's Growing Hispanic Ministry!



In the United States, Hispanics are the second-largest ethnic population. By 2060, it is expected that Hispanics will constitute more than 27 percent of the American population. As a mass media Gospel outreach organization, LHM is committed to reaching this rapidly growing audience with the Good News of the Gospel.

"The future is bright for connecting with Hispanics in North America. Join us in these efforts with your prayers that God reaches down through LHM to bring the Gospel to those who have yet to hear, that they might meet Jesus and find a home in His church," says Rev. Dr. Chad Lakies, LHM's vice president of ministry engagement.

Hispanic Heritage Month is a time designated to celebrate and recognize the rich cultural and historical heritage and contributions of Spanish-speaking communities in the United States. It can also be a time to educate and learn together.

When did it begin? It began in 1968 as Hispanic Heritage Week under President Lyndon Johnson and was expanded by President Ronald Reagan in 1988 to encompass a 30-day period.

When is it celebrated? It is celebrated in the United States from September 15 to October 15.

Why September 15? It begins on that date to commemorate the independence of several Latin American countries, including Costa Rica, El Salvador, Guatemala, Honduras, and Nicaragua, which gained their independence on September 15, followed by Mexico on September 16 and Chile on September 18.

Who is "Hispanic"? Hispanic Heritage Month is not limited to a single nationality or ethnic group but celebrates the diversity of cultures and countries that make up the Hispanic community, including the millions of people whose ancestors came from Mexico, Central America, the Caribbean, South America, and Spain.

Responding to the increasing need for Spanish resources in the United States, LHM continues developing and growing our Hispanic ministry efforts by pouring significant energy into growing our engagement with Hispanics through a variety of resources and programs (visit <u>paraelcamino.com</u>).

"I love going to get my groceries at 9 p.m. because that's usually when I find that some Spanish-speaking young families are shopping," says Lois Schaefer, of Central Florida. "I want to share the love of Jesus with them and let them know they are welcome in the community. I'm equipped with two things. I give them a card about our early learning center at my church. I also have Spanish prayer cards that I got from LHM so that I can tell them I'm praying for them intentionally. Sometimes it will be the seven-year-old in the family that can speak English. I then have the opportunity to talk to them and ask if there is something in particular I can pray about for their family. They are quite often ready to come up with something that they could offer as a request for prayer. I just love the people of our community, and there are so many opportunities for new relationships."

"Over the years that I served in the Florida/Georgia District, we significantly grew our Hispanic ministry, and the resources from LHM were a tremendously helpful way for us to do that," says Rev. Dr. Gregory Walton. "We've been very blessed through our partnership with LHM."

Rev. Mark Eisold, pastor of Pelican Lutheran Church in Naples, Florida, says, "My heart for Jesus showed me the importance that we have as Christians to reach people. LHM's resources are incredibly important; most of them are available online for any church to download, so it's cost-effective. It is such a blessing for anyone who does Spanish outreach. Anywhere you go, and everywhere you look, there are Hispanic people, and they are a blessing, and they want to learn English. But in the meantime, and probably for many years after, they need to hear, read, and receive Christ's love in Spanish."

LHM has created a bilingual Hispanic Heritage Month celebration focused on raising support for our U.S. Hispanic Ministries.
