

This will not be done in consecutive months, but over the course of the next year I will walk you through the Divine Service, in particular Divine Service setting 3 pg. 184-202, so that you may know better how and why we do what we do. Everything in church has meaning that points us to the faith, Scripture and Christ. For this first one, we will look at confession and absolution.

First we have an opening hymn or hymn of invocation, for churches that do an opening procession, which involves the Pastor and several helpers processing (walking) from the back of the sanctuary to the front, this order includes the crucifer (cross bearer), the lucifers (light bearers), the person who carries the Scriptures (lectionary book), and the Pastor or Pastors. The purpose of the hymn is to get the Pastor from the back of the sanctuary to the front of the sanctuary.

Then we have invocation, in which we recognize that we come before the Lord, the triune God, and seek His Forgiveness, His Word, and His Sacrament. We do this by reciting the trinitarian formula found in Matthew 28: 19. Every part of the liturgy comes from Scripture and if you look off to the right-hand side of the page you will see these references. You will also notice that I face the altar when doing this, this reason is very fascinating or at least I think so. This being that I the Pastor am both a worshipper and the one in the stead of Christ giving Christ's gifts to you. To simplify, if I am facing the altar I am a worshipper, and if I face you then I am giving you Christ in His stead.

After the invocation, we have the call to confession inspired by Hebrews 10:22. The verse tells us that when we walk in faith, we will receive what the Lord has promised us, the forgiveness of sins, and He will do it. This is followed by a confession that the Lord is our help taken from the words of King David in Psalm 124:8, and a declaration of confession from King David in Psalm 32.

After a short silence for reflection on God's Word and self-examination, we then confess our sins. Now you will notice that are two columns for the confession and absolution, the right side is for when the liturgy is led by someone who is not ordained, you will see under the "P" for the absolution and that the word "we" is used instead of the word "I" as on the left column. We call this the general absolution which also comes from Scripture: Mark 16:16 and John 1:12. But we normally use the left side column, because I am an ordained Pastor and thus called in Christ's stead. I can give God's forgiveness in His place. In the confession we truthfully confess that we are sinners who have been brought low by sins and that we deserve punishment both in this temporal life and in eternity and that we desire forgiveness. However, we make an appeal to the Father for His Grace and His Mercy, asking Him to remember the sufferings and death of His Son Jesus Christ.

Then in the absolution we remember the words of John 20:19-23, in which Christ has sent the Apostles and future Pastors to go and pronounce the forgiveness of sins in His Name. And so, in the authority given me by Christ, just as the Apostles and many Pastors before me, I pronounce the forgiveness of your confessed sins in the Trinitarian name, making the sign of the cross out in front of me, so that you know that it is the Lord who is forgiving you.

Have comfort therefore that when you come to the Lord's House, you are in Heaven being served by the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit, as He has promised.



This book, written for children, helps young people understand the creed and the beautiful words we all profess and proclaim. We invite all young people to attend.



The gift of the Bible

Certain parts of the Bible are hard to understand — and even harder to explain to children. But the late Rachel Held Evans made a start, and then coauthor Matthew Paul Turner completed *What Is the Bible?* This picture book can help adults as well as kids receive the gift of Scripture.

The Bible is often described as a library of books. Held and Turner explain that it's also many different kinds of writing: stories, poems, wise sayings, songs, letters. Scripture tells of Creation, good and evil rulers, miraculous events, animals that spoke or brought food to hungry people, even monsters!

The best part, the authors write, is that “in the Bible we meet Jesus, who teaches us new things about God, faith, and ourselves” — above all, that God loves us. “And if a story in [Scripture] is confusing or scary or sad, we can imagine how Jesus, who loves us, might tell us that story.”

Bible scholars call this “the canon within the canon.” As Christians, we read all other parts of Scripture through the lens of the Gospels, where we meet God *in person*, as Jesus. Similarly, 500 years ago Martin Luther called the Bible “the cradle that holds the Christ.” That’s a word-picture even children can grasp!



August is the last month of Summer. It sure has been a warm one 🤖. Enjoy!



And bring to naught all He has done





The challenge of Scripture

GQ magazine recently included the Bible on a list of 21 books not worth reading, calling the text “repetitive” and “foolish” (among other things). Pushback came from both secular and religious folks. Writing in *USA Today*, Tim Swarens argued that even if you don’t believe in God, the Bible helps you understand Western culture, history, current events and your neighbors.

For Christians, the Bible — God’s inspired Word — reveals God’s love and will. It isn’t always easy to read or process, but no other book contains such good news.

As Danielle Shroyer writes in *Original Blessing*, “Scripture is a sacred book meant to provoke us in ways that will move us toward God. And often, that is the very last thing we are looking for. We would rather have an answer, a simple plan, even a nicely tidy moral story. But Scripture gives us none of these things, because the holy is anything but domestic. We go looking to find a plan and instead are sent on a treasure hunt.”

At a residence in one of mainland China's huge cities, a package arrives. The resident happily receives his long-awaited package, a box containing Luther's *Small Catechism* and other Lutheran books in his Chinese language. Finally, he can learn more about Jesus Christ!

Four weeks later...

A knock comes at that same door. When the homeowner answers, he is surprised to see the police. "Where are the books you received?" the officers demand. "What have you done with them?" The police take the books and force the man to tell them his social media passwords, then give him a stern warning about receiving any more books from overseas.

This true event illustrates the challenge of being a Christian in communist China. Rev. Wang (LHF's layout artist for simplified Chinese translations) is well aware of the dangers.

"From the Chinese government's perspective, Christian publications from the West are very dangerous," Rev. Wang explained. "People can be charged with spreading information illegally. I know a pastor who was convicted of illegal publication and distribution. He was sentenced to prison for 7 years, and he is still in prison."

Restrictions of the state church

The Chinese government does allow some Christian churches to openly practice the faith, including the Catholic Church and the Three-Self Patriotic Movement (TSPM), the official government-supervised organization for Protestantism. All Protestant denominations are lumped together in the TSPM because "the government sees different denominations as a threat to political unity," Rev. Wang said. "If you have denominations, you're going to fight."

The Chinese Communist Party rules the TSPM and has the power to register churches and censor them. Any indications of outreach or attempts to convert new believers — including one's own children — are quickly squashed.

"There is no infant baptism," Rev. Wang explained. "The government doesn't allow baptism under the age of 18; it's against the law. Also, if you're under 18, you're not allowed to go into a church building. This is enforced very strictly in China today."

Development of house churches

"So if parents want their children to go to church, they go to a house church," Rev. Wang said. (Rev. Wang was raised in a house church himself. To read more about his life and ministry, [click here](#).)

Although house churches and their activities are illegal in China, believers persist in gathering for Bible study and worship. Due to the secretive nature, it's impossible to know how many house churches exist in the country, but believers are numbered in the millions. Rev. Wang's own congregation has about 50 baptized members whose worship life revolves around LHF's simplified Chinese translation of Luther's *Small Catechism*.

The treasure of the catechism

In their weekly worship, Rev. Wang leads his congregation through the *Small Catechism*: recognizing their sin through the 10 Commandments, confessing their faith in the Savior through the Apostles' Creed, learning to pray through the Lord's Prayer and more.

"I think that Luther's *Small Catechism* is like a small Bible," Rev. Wang related. "As a Lutheran Christian, I can't leave this book! I have benefited not only from reading it, but also from implementing it in our daily lives — for example, when we repent, when we are sad, when we doubt the Lord."

For Chinese Christians, LHF's translations are a lifeline to other Christians throughout the world, reminding them that though they may be isolated, they are not alone.

Outcasts in an atheist world

As China's economy has grown and the values of financial success and hard work have taken root, many Chinese Christians experience additional scorn from their atheist and Buddhist family and neighbors.


"For sure, there is isolation as a Christian in China, and some hostility," Rev. Wang shared. "There's no tolerance for Christians. People think you're crazy, you're lazy, you're weak, you don't work hard. [Because we focus on eternal life], they think we just want to escape into another world. 'Who cares about eternal life? We're trying to make money.'

"For Lutherans, it's worse because even among Christians in general, Lutheranism is such a tiny, strange circle. Why would you want to be a Lutheran? They think we are bizarre."

To provide more faith-building resources and help Chinese Christians minimize the risks of printed books, Rev. Wang works part-time for LHF, doing graphic design and layout of new books, such as the upcoming *God's Word For You*. Because LHF owns the copyright to this book, it's going to be freely distributed digitally in China. People will be able to download the brightly illustrated Bible storybook and forward to others.

Interestingly, the Chinese government doesn't seem to be able to track digital exchanges efficiently. "We just pass around PDFs," Rev. Wang said. "It's very hard for the government to track. There are so many people doing it that they can't catch everyone. So digital publications are very useful in the life of the church.

"The government is in charge, and even though the situation is not very pleasant in China, the Lord is gracious!" Rev. Wang concluded. "Christians are tested through trials, and their faith is purified. We trust in the Lord for His Church."



Sharing Christ's Love Through Holistic Ministry

Martin Luther believed that deeds of love expressed toward one's fellow human beings through works of charity were the vocation to which every Christian is called. This is also the teaching of Jesus Himself, who said the "greatest commandment" is to love God and love your neighbor "with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind" (see Matthew 22:36-39).

What Lutheran Hour Ministries calls "holistic ministry" today is aimed at loving our neighbor, and therefore loving Christ Himself, through word and deed. LHM's ministry centers often incorporate holistic approaches to sharing the Gospel that address people's physical and emotional needs as well as spiritual ones.

LHM's on-the-ground presence in many locations around the world often allows staff and volunteers to respond quickly following natural disasters. This was the case in Myanmar following a 7.7 magnitude earthquake in March that devastated not only that country but reached into neighboring Thailand. Thankfully, LHM staff in both locations are confirmed safe. However, the earthquake resulted in more than 3,500 deaths and left thousands of others injured or missing.

LHM-Myanmar staff recently visited the earthquake zone to provide much needed assistance to the survivors. In addition to providing daily necessities, staff supported victims with Psychological First Aid (PFA) and Psychosocial Spiritual Support (PSS) programs. These programs encourage affected individuals to better cope with their situation, connect them with others who can provide support and understanding, and allow them to focus on a future filled with recovery and healing. Please continue to pray for those affected by this devastating tragedy as well as our staff and volunteers as they build ongoing relationships with survivors in the coming months.

LHM-Sri Lanka recently organized four successful events to assist more than 300 families who had been impacted by severe flooding. Each event provided essential dry cooking items like rice, flour, milk powder, spices, tea, and biscuits as well as hygiene items such as soap.

LHM staff also had an opportunity to share the Gospel message through songs, a short message, and a teledrama. The response from affected families was overwhelming, and many expressed their sincere gratitude to LHM–Sri Lanka for assisting them in this way.

“Often the recipients of holistic efforts like this desire to learn more about the God who motivates these Christians to reach out in love,” says LHM CEO Kurt Buchholz.

In communities where people struggle with poverty, LHM ministry centers often assist individuals through vocational training, educational materials, nutritional supplements, hygiene supplies, or medical clinics. These efforts open doors for LHM to share Christ-centered resources and invite people to participate in **Bible Correspondence Courses** and other ministry programs.

In early March, **LHM–Cameroon** celebrated the 11th graduating class from its Divine Sewing School. The celebration was featured on the national news in Cameroon that evening where millions of people watched and heard about this transformative program that rescues women who have been victims of violence by teaching them a trade.

The young women learn how to dye cloth, create and cut clothing patterns, sew, and custom tailor their creations so they can financially support themselves upon graduating from the program. The relationships established during this long-term course help LHM staff and volunteers share their faith as trusted friends to these young women. But above all, the program helps these women find hope through Jesus, so they can face life with confidence.

A similar program in **Liberia**, the Dorcas Sewing Class, continues to experience great success in attracting both Christians and non-Christians and empowering them through skills development and fellowship. This initiative not only helps women gain practical skills for developing financial independence but also fosters a sense of community among the participants—many who hear the Gospel for the first time during the ongoing classes.

During the program’s most recent graduation ceremony, 38-year-old Lovetta was recognized not only for her exceptional skill but also for her inspiring resilience. Having recently lost her husband, Lovetta faced the daunting challenge of providing for her family on her own. Despite her grief, she committed herself wholeheartedly to the sewing program, determined to build a new life for herself and her five children. As the ceremony progressed, the atmosphere was filled with anticipation as LHM–Liberia prepared to honor her dedication in a special way.

To Lovetta’s surprise and delight, ministry staff presented her with a brand-new sewing machine, a gesture that brought tears to her eyes. The machine was more than just a tool - it was a lifeline, a symbol of hope, and a means to rebuild her life after the devastating loss of her husband. The room erupted in applause as Lovetta, overwhelmed with gratitude, expressed her thanks to LHM–Liberia for empowering her to turn her skills into a sustainable livelihood.




Cyber Corner for August

This month I want to focus some more on Phishing. As I said they have whole books on this, and companies focus heavily on this because this is the biggest way they get your data, deploy malware, and deliver ransomware attacks. So, here I will give an example that I personally got and what to look for.

First, I just want to touch on the Dark Web. To take a quote from Star Wars “you will never find a more wretched hive of scum and villainy”. While there are legit business and good people there, there are a lot of black-market drugs and other illegal items are sold there. And it is where hackers and scammers live. I will not show you how to get there, because there is no need to do so, and it is extremely dangerous to do so; especially if you do not know what to do to protect yourself. People and businesses that do go there know how to protect themselves and they will tell you it is never enough to protect yourself from hackers that will see you there, among others. So, while it may seem cool to go to the Dark Web, I strongly recommend that you never go there. However, I am bringing this up because there is one thing I want to point out. While I think it is rare, but if in say an email, you see anything with “.onion” in it, in a link or in the email address; this is a red flag, because this has to do with the Dark Web. Another red flag would be if they tell you to get “Tor” to access a web site.

So, in phishing attacks, you may get an email that will, on the surface look legit, like from your bank saying that your account may have been compromised and you need to click on a link to change your password, or to call them. Some will claim you owe a bill for an order you did not make. Like right now I keep getting that my PayPal account is paying for an order for one thing or another. Well as I said before you should never respond in the email, you should instead contact the company in question directly (like your bank). But there are some things to look for, if you are not sure. I have included here an email I got below; that we can use as an example of what to look for. First, look at the address where it comes from or where it is going, does that look like the company email. Chances are it is not going to have a Gmail account, and it should have the company name in there somewhere. You can check the URLs in there too. You should not click on it, but you can hover over it and usually at the bottom of the browser it will show the URL. Does this look like it is going to the company mentioned in the email or redirecting you somewhere else? Notice too if the wording is fretting in nature or expressing urgency to act? Also, notice all the misspellings and bad


grammar here. I do not know why, but quite often the spelling and grammar are off in these kinds of emails. Of course, now with AI, this may be something they corrected.



In a phishing attack they will ask you to click on things in various ways. They may send you something that looks like a newsletter and offer the option unsubscribe from it if you do not want it, and this could be the link that they use to deploy malware.

In general, you need to be very careful about what you click on. I recently I read of an email that is going around where they send you a fake message that looks legit, like it came from say Gmail, stating that "someone logged in to your account" and to click on this to let them know and to fix this. I also read that they are putting out fake checks for "if I am not a robot" check boxes. When they are fake another screen is coming up having you hit commands like this (Windows key + R, Ctrl + V, and Enter); Do not do these, the real check for not a robot will not have you do things like this; this will inject malware into your system. The rule of thumb that I use is that I do not click on any popups or email links or anything that I can possibly avoid. Even when I get an email from somewhere that I feel is 100% safe I will not click on anything they got; in case it has been hijacked by a hacker.

Finally, I just want to mention that it has been reported that text messages have been known to now have the same risk. They can even be made to look like a company you know or from one of your family members or friends. If they have a link in them do not click on it. I also want to point out that while Apple devices have great security in them, they are still susceptible to attacks as well regarding emails or text messages.


FOR Jesus
