## St. Patrick's Day

On March 17<sup>th</sup> we celebrate St. Patrick's Day, a day commonly celebrated by wearing green, drinking beer, and having corned beef and cabbage (which I recommend having in a bowl). But who is St. Patrick? St. Patrick was a Bishop born in 389 A.D. in a Roman controlled part of Britain during the end of the Roman Empire. When he was young, he was taken by Irish raiders to Ireland to be a slave, where he was a pig herder for six years. One night he was guided by a dream that allowed him to escape his captivity. The dream guided him to the Irish shore where he encountered sailors who were heading to Britain, who though they tried to get him to do lewd acts in exchange, gave him safe passage. St. Patrick did not waiver in his faith.

St. Patrick would eventually find his way to France, where he became a monk and a priest. He later was elevated to Bishop; upon his appointment he had made the decision in 433 A.D. to head back to the country where he was a slave. His mission in Ireland was to bring freedom from the slavery to idolatry. He would spend the rest of his life in Ireland, proclaiming the Gospel of Christ, founding communities, and inspiring the country to have the same zeal for missions as he had. On the later work he wrote in his book *Confession*, "This is how we can repay such blessings, when our lives change and we come to know God, to praise and bear witness to His great wonders before every nation under Heaven."

St. Patrick is also known for strict confession of the Trinity, of which he often uttered the phrase, "Three in One and One in Three." It is believed that he died on March 17<sup>th</sup>, hence the date of the holiday. It is also believed that on his death bed sang this stanza from the hymn he wrote, Hymn 604 v. 5, "I bind unto myself the Name, The strong Name of the Trinity By invocation of the same, the Three in One and One in Three. Of whom all nature hath creation, Eternal Father, Spirit, Word. Praise to the Lord of my salvation; Salvation is of Christ, the Lord!"






This grant will help develop and continue to provide Gospel-centered resources to our aging population and many others.

## **New Learning Path for LHM Learn Addresses Anxiety**

Has anxiety been getting the best of you lately-or maybe for quite a while now? A new Learning Path called *Journey Through Anxiety*, composed of two parts from **LHM Learn**, is now available. Based on the **Project Connect** booklet of the same title by AmyRuth Bartlett, these courses offer insights in defining anxiety and help in moving through it. In Part 1, "The Landscape of Fear," users chart a pathway toward understanding anxiety. In Part 2, "Freedom to Flourish," users apply strategies to getting *unstuck* in anxiety in the move to a confident and flourishing life.

Anxiety is a real problem in the world today. Created in God's image, we are made to *relate* and *create*, to be in intimate relationship with God and each other. But anxiety (relentless worries, perceived threats, panic attacks, irrational fears) disrupts this harmony, replacing it instead with shame, self-doubt, and avoidance. It's a vicious cycle that can continue as long as we allow it to, but we don't have to allow it to.

This is where *Journey Through Anxiety* can help. "These courses are designed with rigorous, scientific foundations, but presented in a way that is completely understandable, and even with a bit of fun," says Chris Macky, LHM's content development manager. "The game board illustration with signposts along the way lets users know how they're progressing through anxiety-based obstacles and barriers in their journey toward their ultimate objective: freedom to flourish," he adds.

Naturally, we want to move past our anxieties and leave them in the rearview mirror. To do that requires an honest, no-nonsense self- appraisal and then resisting the urge to quick fix our way out of discomfort. Course exercises prompt users to explore their anxieties and to consider creative approaches for navigating through them. "By doing this the user is escorted through each barrier via very practical activities they can do right now," Macky says.

In whatever level of anxiety we live in, Christ is there with us. As the author of Hebrews says, "Let us then with confidence draw near to the throne of grace, that we may receive mercy and find grace to help in time of need" (Hebrews 4:16).

## PASTOR, T CHILDREN BURNED

Clergyman Suffers Severe Burns on Face and Hands in Oil Furnace Explosion at Kenmore—Two Small Boys Slightly Scorched

Explosion of an oil furnace in the basement of Pilgrim Lutheran church. Kenmore. last night, resulted in the Rev. F. J. Muhlhauser, pastor church, suffering severe burns about the face and hands, and two small boys receiving lesser injuries. The blast shattered every window in the basement and pushed out three walls, two in the furnace room and one in an adjoining chamber. The explosion occurred shortly before the scheduled hour of a Washington's birthday entertainment which would have filled the chapel with children.

The celebration was to have begun at 8 o'clock. Shortly after 7 o'clock the Rev. Mr. Muhlhauser arrived at the chapel and went to the basement to turn up the oil furnace, which had been burning low.

### Cause Not Ascertained.

Kneeling before the heating plant, the clergyman turned the small flame down and then up nearly to full force. Whether the explosion was caused by fumes which had collected during the day from the slow burning oil heater or whether it was caused by spontaneous combustion of the carbon in the flues could not be ascertained.

There was a sudden gust of flames, which completely enveloped the clergyman. Two children, Gordon Isenberger, eleven years old, 85 Tremaine avenue, and Ralph Monrad, ten years old, 85 Crosby road, were standing nearby, but were only

slightly scorched.

## Saves Entire Structure.

Before quitting the blazing furnace, the clergyman, retaining his presence of mind, turned the flame out. Police say this probably saved the entire structure from destruction.

Dr. E. R. Linklater, 2770 Delaware avenue, Kenmore, who treated the Rev. Mr. Muhlhauser, declared the clergyman's eyes would have been burned out had it not been for his glasses. As it was, the clergyman suffered severe burns in face and hands. It is feared he may be scarred for life. He was resting easily last night.

He laughed while he told how tenyear-old Ralph Monrad ran to his mother for aid when someone dis-

patched him for a physician.

"Lenten services will be continued Wednesday," he declared. "I'll be there, but not in the pulpit. I am going to try and get an old friend of mine, the Rev. Henry Woidke of the Nazareth Lutheran church, to take my place."
