We continue to look at the Divine Service by continuing with the hymn of the day or otherwise called the sermon hymn. We call the hymn by those names because it points to the hymn's purpose, which is to prepare the hearer for the sermon that is about to be preached. I will pretty much pick the hymn based on the text that I am preaching for that Sunday. Ruth and I use a book called "Lutheran Service Book Hymn Selection Guide." The book suggests hymns based on both the liturgical time of year and the readings for that particular day.

Next of course is the sermon itself, in which I as the Pastor, or a guest Pastor or our field worker Albert, will preach God's Word. This includes an understanding of the text, liturgical context, law and gospel, and encouragement to live a holy life as a redeemed child of eternity. We follow the sermon with the offering and then the offertory which is based on the words of King David in psalm 51: 10-12. In the text, King David is asking the Lord to restore his heart to that of a faithful believer and to remind him of the promises of eternal salvation given to God's people. This is appropriate after the sermon because of the reminder in the proclamation to be steadfast children of God knowing that we need His help to do so.

Then comes the Prayer of the church, in which the liturgist, myself or Albert, will bring the church's prayers before the Lord. If you have people that need praying for, please write them on the prayer cards in the pews. The Prayers of the Church go back to the Old Testament in which the priests and the prophets brought the prayers of the people before the Lord, and Scripture tells us that the Lord hears our prayers.

This brings us to the end of the Service of the Word, the second part of the Divine Service with the first part being confession and absolution. We will continue next month with the service of the Sacrament, the third part.

I figured I would also introduce you to Albert Ho, our field worker from Concordia Lutheran Theological Seminary in St. Catharines, Ontario. Here is what he had to say about himself:

"I'm in my final year of seminary, so God willing, I'll be receiving my first call in May. I was born in Toronto, Ontario, but grew up in Calgary, Alberta. I went to McGill University in Montreal where I did a Bachelor of Arts in Classical Studies. During my undergraduate studies, I served in the Canadian Army Reserve as an Infantry Officer and retired during my first year of seminary in St. Catharines in 2022. I studied abroad at Westfield House in Cambridge, England in the 2022-2023 academic year, and that year I also had the opportunity to visit even more of our sister churches in Europe, namely The Evangelical Lutheran Mission Diocese of Finland and the Independent Evangelical - Lutheran Church (SELK) in Germany. I returned from vicarage in Winkler, Manitoba this past July. A great lesson impressed on me in all my travels is that the body of Christ is not limited by blood or borders. We truly are one in Christ, and it is an especially joyous thing when this unity is also joined by the concord of being one in confession. As such, I am excited to continue my formation for the pastoral office among my brothers and sisters in Kenmore, NY."

The long view of Advent

Advent is about preparing not only for Christmas but also for Jesus' return. According to Scripture, that won't be the calm, silent scene described in Christmas carols.

In 1928, Dietrich Bonhoeffer preached: "It is very remarkable that we face the thought that God is coming so calmly, whereas previously peoples trembled at the day of God We have become so accustomed to the idea of divine love and of God's coming at Christmas that we no longer feel the shiver of fear that God's coming should arouse in us. We ... [forget] the serious aspect, that the God of the world draws near to the people of our little earth and lays claim to us."

God is love; we'll be in good hands at the end of time. But during Advent, also be in awe of God. Embrace a reverent fear of the Lord that reminds you how profound it is that God chooses again and again to draw near and lay claim to you.



A Day to Honor Our Veterans

On November 11, 1918, the Germans and the Allied Nations, which included the United States, signed a document to initiate an armistice (cessation of hostilities), thus ending World War I. A year later, President Woodrow Wilson issued a proclamation designating November 11 as Armistice Day. It was to be a day of reflection — a day to remember those who died in the country's service and to offer Americans the opportunity "to show sympathy with peace and justice in the councils of the nation."

Wanting to recognize more specifically America's veterans, Congress passed a bill changing the name of the day from Armistice Day to Veterans Day. The change was made in May 1954.

On this national holiday, churches around the nation hold services of prayers and praise. Followers of the Prince of Peace pray for peace among the nations of Earth and for the day when "they shall beat their swords into plowshares, and their spears into pruning hooks; nation shall not lift up sword against nation, neither shall they learn war anymore" (Isaiah 2:4, NRSV).



A Thanksgiving Hymn That Sees God's Hand Everywhere

For a hymn that captures the beauty and gratitude of Thanksgiving, All Things "Bright and Beautiful" is a perfect choice Its lyrics paint vivid pictures — flowers opening in the morning sun, birds singing, golden sunsets, purple-topped mountains and rivers rushing by. It all leads to this joyful reminder: "He gave us eyes to see them, and lips that we might tell: How great is God Almighty, who has made all things well."

The hymn was written by Cecil Frances Alexander (1818–1895), an Irishwoman with a passion for teaching children about God. She wrote many hymns for her Sunday school class, later collected in *Verses for Holy Seasons*.

But her ministry went beyond music — she spent her life serving the poor, comforting the sick, and caring for the grieving. When she passed away, "a great throng" gathered to remember her, honoring both her faith and the beauty she shared with the world.

Did you know? November 1st is All Saints Day (the day after All Hallows Eve referenced last month). It celebrates the unity of the Church Triumphant (those in heaven) and of the Church Militant (those of us still alive).

<u>Bible verse of the month:</u> "Oh give thanks to the LORD, for he is good, for his steadfast love endures forever!" - Psalm 107:1

Catechism: The Close of the commandments and its explanation:

Remembering The Saints



When Paul wrote to the church in Rome, he addressed his letter "To all God's beloved ... who are called to be saints" (Romans 1:7, NRSV). Paul regarded his fellow believers as people who have responded to the good news of Christ by choosing to follow and serve God.

The New Testament emphasizes that Christians are God's beloved — special people set apart to receive his grace and to be his witnesses. All people whose minds and hearts are devoted to God are "called to be saints."

About 700 years after the church began, leaders designated November 1 as All Saints' Day to honor people whose lives reflect Christ dwelling within them. Because of what God has done for us, all Christians can wear the label of saint.



Cyber Corner for November

Hello readers, in my last article I left you with how it is possible for malware to be put on your phone and have your call redirected to the hackers. And things like this can happen even with the precaution that I have told you about. Like not downloading anything you do not know. Or clicking on something in an email or text message. For example, a legitimate web site could have had code injected into it that both you and they do not know about; and now you have something on your computer or phone that that is do who knows what. Then, especially with AI, these scams are getting so sophisticated that even security experts are having a hard time detecting them. However, there are some additional tools you can and should incorporate to help protect yourself. Again, I cannot tell you enough that nothing is full prof.

First, I cannot express the importance of a good Anti-Virus software and while there are low cost and even free ones, this is one area you should not skimp on and get a god one. Anti-Virus software protects your PC and other device like your phone form Malware and viruses; but a good one will do more like protect you when you are going to web site, that may have harmful code on them. They will monitor your internet connection for any harmful software that any be out there; mine even warns me of risky text messages I get. It will constantly monitor your system and if it finds a virus it will either get rid of it or quarantine it; depending on how you set it up. I can tell you my software has found and caught many over the years. Now any anti-Virus program will have a way to send you updates and you must keep up with having them installed at least weekly; and most you can set it to have them do this automatically. Now, anything that I or anyone else recommend there will always be people that will say that it is junk and theirs is the best. in the different tools that I am talking about here, I can at least tell you I have used and extensively researched; except for the VPN I will talk about later in this article. So, for an Anti-Virus I recommend (Norton 360). I have used this for years, and big corporations even use it, though they have a corporate version. Also, I check pretty much every year, and they are usually either 1st. or 2nd for top Anti-Virus software in a number of places like PC magazine. Other good ones are Malwarebytes, McAfee, Avast, and TotalAV; though I have not used the last two they are usually rated up there with Norton. Good ones will also search the Dark Web and report to you what they find and what you need to do. Norton also comes with a Password Manager, storage to back up your data, and a VPN, and an app for your phone as well. However, whatever you get I cannot emphasize enough that this is the most important thing you can do to protect yourself. And you really need to do this if you do nothing else.

Next is a good VPN (virtual private network) is a software (though there are hardware VPNs too) that id used to send your data on the network over an encrypted network; that is private. It hides your IP address (this identifies your device and where you are). So, in short, they cannot see your data

and where it came from. Now I have heard people say you do not need a VPN because if you go to a web site that has HTTPS (as opposed to HTTP), as I have told you to do, it is encrypted anyway, so why would you need a VPN? So first, while we should, we do not always look to make sure we are going to an HTTPS (that is an encrypted site). Then some sites that we have to go to are not HTTPs sites. Then some sites will first take you to an HTTP version and then redirect you to a HTTPS version of their site; given a hacker just enough opportunity to perform a Man In the Middle attack. Then even if the site you are going to is HTTPS your data, on its way there, is not encrypted. Finally, if you do mistakenly, maybe through Phishing attack, go to a bad site, they will make it look like it is HTTPS but will not be. A VPN protects your data from your device on through to where you are going and hides your location. To explain the differences in VPS would get very technical but after doing a lot of research I like NordVPN it seems to be the strongest and incorporates a lot of security that they use on the dark web. Now, like any of the top tools, it does cost, but again in most reports it is rated either 1st. 2nd. as a top VPN. However, if you get Norton Anti-Virus 360 it comes with a VPN. Though while it is very good it is not as good as NordVPN. So, besides encrypting your data the VPN helps hide you and your data from hackers, and ISPs (internet service providers); for some people that matters; but always remember if the government or police want to see you and your data, they will even with the best tools. Only mention this because again nothing full proof. It all depends on how valuable what you have is to them, and what resources they have.

Next in the line of tools you should have is a good password manager. The one thing you never want to do is store your passwords in text or Excel files, on you devise or anywhere. Now, I have sad in other articles that you should have a password that looks like this (H&7^6Y dhMJ237#48I je9\$s%5), and no two passwords that you use should ever be the same. How are you going to remember them not to mention you should be constantly changing them? A good password manager will let you know if the passwords you use are strong or weak and if they are duplicated. It will also let you know when you should be replacing them; and will give you an option to let them generate it for you. For this I like NordPass, yes this is the same people I recommend for your VPN. Again, before I got this, I heavily researched it and found they are one of the best. Their policies are so strong that even the people that work there do not have access to your passwords. They offer very high security regarding storing your passwords, notes, and credit cards, and will even auto fill your username and password in sites for you when you log on to a site. They also will let you know if they find your passwords on the dark web. Now, as I said earlier, Norton Anti-Virus 360 comes with a Password manager, but I feel this is much better. This also costs either yearly or monthly depending on how you go, but whatever you do, do not get a free one; it could even belong to a hacker.

Lastly, I want to talk about your browsers like Edge and Google Crome, that you use to go to the web sites you visit. Taking some time to learn about the security settings on that can be a study in itself, but worth it. Here you must have a balance if you set all the security, they have good luck on using it. One of the biggest things you want here is to prevent people from tracking where you are going and what you are doing on the web. This was largely used so companies can market you by seeing what interest you have. But hackers also will use this to learn about you and develop Phishing attacks as well as others. Here I am going to give you a free tool to use called DuckDuckGo (a privacy browser). After doing research, I found this is the browser they use on the dark web to provide anonymity to their browsing, though it might be a different version; because on the dark web you definitely want to do anything you can to hide yourself. Now again Norton – Anti Virus 360 provides something similar. If you feel this is a lot you are right, but it is only the basics. Experienced

security people and hackers do all this and a lot more. As I mentioned, they have attempted to hack me, and open accounts in my name, a few times this year alone. A friend lost a few thousand due to a phishing attack. As I also said, I have been hit with viruses, and attempts have been made to attack my online accounts. So far these have not gone anywhere with me because of everything that I have said in other articles and the fact that I do all the things I have mentioned in this article. And still, I am constantly looking deeper at what I need to do further. Well, enough with the doom and gloom, in my next article I go back to telling you about some more scams I have been informed of; it will make for a great Christmas gift.

Mite Explanation and History

Based on the Biblical account of the widow's mite (Luke 21:1–4), the Mite Box is intended for regular contributions of "mites" — offerings above and beyond the support given to congregations and the LCMS. Mite Box contributions amount to millions of dollars that fund district and national mission grants and implement the LWML program.

<u>Mite Boxes</u>, available from the district, zone, or LWML office, are distributed to every woman in a society, and often to each member of the congregation. Local groups submit Mite Box offerings to the appointed district officer.

The Widow's Mite

Jesus sat down opposite the place where the offerings were put and watched the crowd putting their money into the temple treasury. Many rich people threw in large amounts. But a poor widow came and put in two very small copper coins, worth only a fraction of a penny. Calling his disciples to him, Jesus said, "I tell you the truth, this poor widow has put more into the treasury than all the others. They all gave out of their wealth, but she, out of her poverty, put in everything — all she had to live on" (Mark 12:41–43).

Mite Boxes — How They Began

Perhaps inspired by the various "cent" or "mite" societies of the early 1800s, the Woman's Mission to Woman (Baptist) urged members in its first circular letter in 1871 to use their new Mite Box to raise funds. The entire family was encouraged to contribute. The garnet-colored paper box had an opening on the top and the words, "Woman's Mission to Woman," in gold letters on the side.

Over the years, many Lutheran Ladies Aid societies used a box to gather funds in support of local and synod ministries. Under the original 1928 Lutheran Women's Missionary Endeavor organizational plan, each woman in every congregation would receive a Mite Box if she participated in the Ladies Aid. Receipts from the 92 Ladies Aid societies totaled \$6651.31 in 1930.

The Lutheran Women's Missionary League, formally recognized by the Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod in 1942, required by the newly adopted constitution and bylaws, that <u>25% of</u> all missionary contributions be given to the national organization, shared from the districts.

Times and Mite Boxes Change

Mite Boxes have changed in color and design over the years, but what has never changed is the dedication of freely given offerings for the purpose of reaching out to others with the Good News of Jesus Christ. <u>Districts still retain 75% of mite offerings for the work of the LWML at that level.</u> National mites fund over \$1 million in mission grants.



Thred Is Helping People Share Their Faith Online

"Do you feel like your spiritual life is a part of your social media life?" This is the question Thred (thred.org) asks, and in the internet-driven world we live in, it's an important one for Christians. Research indicates that nearly 5 billion people use social media worldwide, with the average person spending a whopping 2.5 hours each day drinking from that well. That's a lot of communication going on!


Thred understands that connecting with people can be complicated, and sharing matters of faith online can be even more daunting. "Thred's number—one downloaded content piece is the helpful guide, Engaging in Spiritual Conversations: How to Overcome the Obstacles to Sharing Your Faith," says Rachel Tichich, manager of digital strategy and development for LHM. "It embodies a core piece of Thred's philosophy, and that is simply this: your story matters." But telling that story can be a challenge.

To address this, at the beginning of 2025 Thred launched two FREE resources. "The first was The Search for Self. It reminds users that as Christ-followers we identify as children of God, which in this image-oriented world we live in is not always easy to remember," Tichich says. "The other piece is Not My Job. This resource encourages people to see their place in the Gospel narrative and inspires them to talk about what God has done and is doing in their lives."


Thred's current push is to create an email series to its 21,000-plus followers that gives people tangible tips and easy—to—use writing prompts for sharing their faith on social media or through text message or email. "Through the distribution of these resources, Thred is seeing an increase in followers on Instagram and Facebook as well, where it also continues to publish content throughout the week," says Tichich.


All this resource development requires a lot of writing. To do this, Thred employs the skilled pens of several creative individuals who produce content for Thred's courses, email series, Influencer sermon kit, and blogs, which come in six distinct flavors: Calling & Purpose, Culture & Faith, Digital Evangelism, Spiritual Discipline, Spiritual Identity, and From the Thred Desk.

"We're attempting to communicate with our audience in a way that feels familiar, warm, and accessible," says Andréa Vasilo, LHM's content writer. This is Thred's mission from start to finish: helping people find their digital voice to share their faith and take the story of Jesus to the ends of the world.
